## **PhD: ‘Society Building – Welfare, Time and Social Capital’.**

This study examined bridging social capital across Esping-Andersen’s three main classifications of welfare regime - market-focused liberal, status-focused corporatist, and equality-focused social democratic regimes. Each regime was analysed with regard to the proposition that welfare can ‘build society’ by promoting social capital, and avoiding the worst effects of commodification (market dependency), stratification (inequality and stigma), and familialisation (paternalistic family dependency). Acknowledging measurement problems, and examining the theories from Putnam, Bourdieu, Coleman, etc, social capital was defined as norms of trust, networks of association membership, and practices of volunteering and socialising, and its bridging variant was measured using data from the World Values Survey and Multinational Time Use Study.

Results showed that social democratic welfare regimes had the highest levels of bridging social capital, corporatist regimes had low but constant levels, and liberal welfare regimes had experienced declines in trust. The social capital decline in liberal regimes was attributable in part to synchronous changes in welfare (means-testing, greater inequality encouraging more commodification and stratification), and low levels in corporatist countries was attributable in part to male/female work imbalances and attitudes (encouraging more familialisation). Overall empirical testing of relations between welfare regimes and social capital show that both are linked most positively under universal rather than means-tested conditions.

## ARC Discovery Grant 2009-2011

### **‘Poor Women and Lonely Men: Examining Gendered Social Inclusion and Connection in Australia.’**

This project will increase understanding of social inclusion and connection in Australia by revealing their common gendered basis. Preliminary evidence from studies of social exclusion and social capital suggest more women face economic barriers to participation from ageing alone with less superannuation, becoming lone parents, or having fewer post-school qualifications and reduced earnings, while more men face social barriers from having poorer support networks. Using quantitative social exclusion, connection, time-use, and HILDA panel data, along with qualitative interview data, this project will investigate the potentially central role of gender in the dynamics of social inclusion, connection, and wellbeing in Australia.
